

Background:

-Acting as the Post 2015 Development Agenda (successor to the Millennium Development Goals)



Year’s celebration of United Nations

- SDG Adopted by UN Resolution A/RES/70/1 of 25 September 2015, and will come into effect on January 1, 2016

-17 Goals, 169 target, 304 indicators(Proposed)

-The World Leaders committed to achieving sustainable development in its three dimensions – economic, social and environmental – in a balanced and integrated manner.

-The Goals and targets will stimulate action over the next fifteen years in areas of critical importance for humanity and the planet: **People, Planet, Prosperity, Peace and Partnership**

Main Features of SDG:

✚ Mobilizing domestic resources will be the key challenges to financing the SDGs
✚ Unlike the millennium development goals, there are no international commitments to funding the SDGs
✚ There will be no grants from the developed countries, whatever they will give will be loans
✚ Engagement of private sector in the implementation process, this time, the business community is not an observer, like it was in the case of MDGs

Major difference between MDGs and SDGs:

➤ The first major difference is that the SDGs are a government and people's agenda
➤ The second difference is that it is a political agreement, not a technical one
➤ The third and final major difference is that SDGs are not implemented by the north countries (developed) to the south.
